6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

The college has the vision of developing a new society comprising of people with high ability – courageous and generous in nature, willing to take up social cause as moral responsibility at this remote rural area (about 500 sq. Km) of highly underprivileged (economically and socially backward) population. Principal mission of the institution is to transform this underdeveloped locality to a part of a 'new world society' with scientific and superstition less attitude and cherishable values of mutual co-operation and tolerance. The mission statement of the college is "Arise, Awake and do not stop till the goal is reached".



6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

- >To inform students, teachers and others management normally uses notification in (i) Notice board and College Website (ii) Advertisement in news paper. (iii) e-mails, sms etc..
- Collection of information and feedback from students is done through students' Union verbally, in written letters and deputations. For various information like activities of alumni, activities with other colleges etc we use internet sources.
- A Grievance / Complain box has been placed in front of the Principal's room.
- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college follows the syllabi developed by Burdwan University. Every department has its own module to complete the syllabus. Some departments arranged educational excursion for curriculum development.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Apart from traditional chalk and talk method, technology based teaching like using projectors, CD's, smart-board are used by some departments are arranged.
- Internet facilities are also provided to students for advance learning in some cases.
- Some depts. of both Arts and Science arranged educational tours for the encouragement of students in learning.
- Advance learners are supplied with books from Dept. Library regarding their queries.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Annual Test Examinations are performed of all programms before final examination. The answer scripts of these examinations are shown to the students prior to declaration of result.
- Regular class tests both in written as well as in oral form are being conducted by some departments for the proper evaluation of the students performance.
- Semester examination started, with the initiation of Choiced Based Credit System from this season following UGC.



6.3.4 Research and Development

- 1. The institution support teachers for submission for pursuing research work.
- 2. The college has a planning board and research advisory-committee to support research work.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Each science dept. and also some Arts dept. have its own library for the benefit of students.
- All books have been catalogued and limited physical access was provided to students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Human Resource Management of the college are maintained by the different advisory committees and statutory bodies like Students Union, Teachers Council, Governing Body.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Whole time teachers are appointed on the recommendation of the WBCSC. PTTs were recruited as per Govt. regulations. Guest teachers are appointed by the college authority conducting interviews by external experts sent by the affiliating University as and when demanded by the departments and approved by the G.B.. Non-Teaching staff members are recruited as per G.O. of the West Bengal Govt.

Best practice-1

Title: "Shabda-Viswa"-the word board.

Goal: The Goal for the practice mentioned above is as follows:

- 1. To increase the use of Bengali Language.
- 2. To know new Bengali word & its meaning regularly.

Context: In recent time or if we recall, from sometime back, the use of Bengali language is found to be decreasing particularly among the young educated people. The digital cyclone has dismantled the love for mother language. The fusion of dialects which are used by common men orally or in written form has created a concern for Bengali language. In this context the IQAC initiated the idea of educating students of this college to absorb one Bengali word and its use regularly.

Practice: The Practice began by instituted a board near the main gate of the college and it was named as "Shabda-Viswa." The meaning of each and every word have wonderful idea with its grammatical form. Each word depicts a world, as it commonly called. The project is controlled by the Bengali Dept. of the college. It's written on every teaching day of the college then its written in a separate register meant for it. At the end of every month the Principal of the college signed and authorized it as an official document. In this process its moving forward.

Evidence of success: The use of one word and its meaning every teaching day, have attracted many to this board to know new word. The increase of stock of word also motivated others to follow the word board. The non-teaching staffs and outsiders come for official works also showed interest to the word board. The most fascinating matter is that many outsiders and surrounding people of the college, once who have seen it, come almost everyday to absorb every Bengali word and its word meaning written on every teaching day. In this way it has created a social outreach programme of the college. There lies its importance.

Problems: The main problem is to write it in a regular way. In very rare occasion its passed on to other day.

In a nutshell, the "Shabda-Viswa"- the word board is a matter of proud for the college.

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Best practice-2

Title: Phytoline and revenue generation.

Goal: The Goal for the practice mentioned above is as follows:

- 1. To help students to observe fresh biological meterials.
- 2. Revenue generation by selling healthy & fresh materials.

Context: It was noted that the biological materials needed for the practical classes in both UG & PG classes. It's generally observed that these materials are collected from the suppliers of scientific materials. But these materials are not found to be in good shape, size etc due to technical process. As a result we had to exchange materials with our friends of other colleges totally free of cost. On the other hand the surrounding area of our college have a very rich source of plant materials. In this context Botany Dept. of this college mooted the idea of supplying materials with reasonable price for revenue generation.

Practice: The process began after the Gonverning Body of the college sanctioned Rs. 5000/- for this pilot project to Botany Dept. The Botany Dept. started collection of different types of plant specimens required for practical classes of the surrounding College and Universities following their syllabus. The specimens processed chemically after its collection, bottled, sealed and labelled properly for despatch. Initially the specimens were tested after one month to verify its nature & finally given away, as per requirement from other institution. It was given in the social networking site for advertisement.

Evidence of success: As the time proceed, the report of freschness of specimens by other institutions, increased its demand through various sources. In this way the Botany Dept. maintained the process and returned Rs. 5000/- to college. The practice is now running smoothly.

The selling of plant specimens to various institutions, as well as revenue generation through it, motivated the idea to run it in a more scientific and methodical way for better and greater cause of the students.

Problems: Although the process became successful it has some drawbacks, like the running fund, its despatch to others as well as to do the whole process within the tight schedule of classes of college.

Still the idea of revenue generation in a small form by selling plant specimens is moving forward with various ideas to move on.

- 2. The college has set up an e-waste management room to recycle and manage the e-waste of the college. An e-waste management team has been constructed with some teachers and non-teaching staff of the college to run the same properly.
- 3. The departments of the college arrange peer-learning classes to enrich the teaching learning ambience.
- 4. The administration meticulously looks after the well being of the students and tries to utilize all the available benefits related to students from the university or government level.

Challenge

- 1. Improvement of the regular attendance of the students.
- 2. Making the library more accessible to students.
- 3. Involvement of more teachers in the college administration.
- 4. Sensitizing the students against private tuition and make them more attentive about class teaching.
